Mr. Feige enjoyed the peace of mind that comes from controlling his legacy and not leaving it to the government to decide.

When we first met he had just lost his beloved wife of 45 years and cherished all the more his three daughters. He told me how much he appreciated that we found promising women students and worked closely with them on effectively embracing conservative ideas, communication skills, traditional values, while preparing them to be women leaders for America. His daughters Margaret, Ann, and Jane described him as a gentle and present father and he truly had a heart for helping young women.

After receiving his degree in Architecture at the University of Washington Mr. Feige launched his own tremendously successful business, Feige Design & Construction Co. in Seattle. He loved the theater and opera, and was a skilled tennis player. And he loved to talk with us about conservative ideas.

We are doing renovations to create a new Headquarters called the Center for Conservative Women, complete with a large Conference Center for special events, an expanded Board Room and Library, and more office space to accommodate a growing team of staff, interns and Fellows.
